

## Juliette Gordon Low Memory Game

**Pumpkin** – Juliette Magill Kinzie Gordon was born on October 31, 1860 (Halloween) in Savannah, Georgia & the 2<sup>nd</sup> out of six children.

**Daisy Flower** - Her uncle took one look at her and said, "She looks like a Daisy." And it became her nickname.

**Little-Ship-Under-Full-Sail** - Another one of her nicknames was "Little Ship." Her grandparents in the North called her that because she would always beg to hear the story about her great-grandmother, Eleanor “Nellie” Lytle Kinzie who was captured by Indians. Even though she was a captive, she was always joyful, so the Indians started calling her "Little-Ship-Under-Full-Sail.

**Horse** - Daisy loved animals and had a horse named “Fire”

**Turkey** - Claiming decapitation was inhumane, Juliette chloroformed the Thanksgiving turkey. It was plucked (feathers pulled out of it) and put in the icebox (refrigerator). The next day when the refrigerator was opened to prepare it for dinner, it jumped out and scared the cook.

**Art Palette** - Daisy loved the arts. She loved to draw and paint pictures - so much, that she created children's magazine with all of the articles and pictures done by children

**Ring** - Juliette Gordon (26) married to William Mackay "Willy" Low, a wealthy Englishman on December 21, 1886.

**Small Bag of Rice** - On her wedding day a piece of rice thrown in celebration became lodged in her ear. When the doctor tried to remove it, he permanently damaged her left eardrum leaving her deaf in that ear. When she was about 25 years old, Juliette suffered an ear infection that was treated with silver nitrate. This treatment damaged her ear, causing her to lose a great deal of her hearing in that ear.

**Tea Pot** – A year after their marriage, Juliette and her husband Willie moved to England for 18 years.

**Picture of Boy Scout** - After Willie died, Juliette met Lord Baden-Powell founder of the Boy Scouts, his wife Lady Olivia Baden-Powell and sister, Edith Baden-Powell, founders of the Girl Guides in 1911.

**Fish** - Juliette loved fishing, in fact she would go out with the men after a formal dinner. It was not unusual for her to go fishing in her evening dress.

**Telephone** - When Juliette arrived home in Savannah, Georgia she made that famous phone call, “I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight!” to her cousin, Nina Anderson Pope. Margaret Daisy “Doots” Gordon, her niece was the first registered member but didn’t attend the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting.

**Girl Scout Pin** - Juliette Gordon Low started the first Girl Scout Troop on March 12, 1912. There were 18 girls in the first troop. At a scout board meeting she stood on her head to display the new Girl Scout shoes that she was wearing.

**Strand of Pearls** - Juliette Low sold her pearls, a wedding gift from her husband, to help fund her Girl Scout programs. She was the sole support for the GSUSA for several years.

**8 inches of Rope** - The first Girl Scout Handbook: "How Girls Can Help Their Country" had instruction on how to tie up a burglar with 8" of rope.

**Juliette Low Portrait Patch** - portrait hangs in the National Portrait Gallery in Washington. It was a gift from Girl Scouts of the USA and was painted by Edward Hughes. Although she never had children of her own, Daisy devoted herself to her "girls." She was 51 years old when she started Girl Scouts.

**Breast Cancer Ribbon** - Juliette Low died of breast cancer on January 18, 1927. She was 66 years old. She was buried in Savannah at Laurel Grove Cemetery wearing her uniform. In her pocket was a telegram that she had received from the national officers of GSUSA shortly before she died. "You are not only the first Girl Scout," it read, "you are the best Girl Scout of them all."

**Juliette Low World Friendship Fund** - The JLWFF was established in 1927 to honor Daisy's life and her dream of world peace and international friendship.

**Tomato Can** - Juliette placed her honor pins in one as she was planning to go a meeting

**Book of Ghost Stories** - she and her girls loved the stories she used to tell around the campfire. She also loved to read

**Liberty Ship** - In WWII a Liberty/cargo ship was named the SS Juliette Low.

**Parrot** - Polly Pooms was Juliette's favorite pet.

**Basketball** - The girls in Juliette's first troop enjoyed playing in their uniform with bloomers and behind heavy curtains.

**Stamp** - The United States Post Office issued a 3 cent, 4 cent and 22 cent commemorative stamp honoring Juliette.

**White Gloves** - Juliette could be found cleaning her home in evening wear and white gloves

**Vegetable Hat** - Juliette would trim her hat with carrots and parsley and go to a fashionable luncheon. "Oh, is my trimming sad?" she would ask as the vegetables drooped. "I can't afford to have this hat done over -- I have to save all my money for my Girl Scouts. You know about the Scouts, don't you?" Fundraising!

**Girl Scouts Picture** - The first uniform was blue. It was a sailor-style blouse, blue tie, navy skirt, and dark stockings. It changed to khaki the next year in 1913.

**WAGGGS Pin** – World Association of Girl Guides & Girl Scouts was formed in 1928 from GS & GG all over the world. Mission is *"To enable girls and young women to develop their fullest potential as responsible citizens of the world."* Offers international programs. Today there are 145 countries and 10 million scout & adult members.
